As we sat down as a collective of teachers and admin to discuss how we were to move forward this year, considered a number of things that have been voiced to us. such as use of lockers, and the ability for students to move to the teachers rather than remaining in one classroom for the entire day. While the School Division has recommended masks be worn in the school, they have given schools latitude to mandate their use in certain situations such as where large groups of students are located in a common when area. or students are doing group work.

So it was decided that at Wainwright High School, in order to accommodate the need for students to access lockers to store their materials, and for them to be allowed to move from class to

class, while maintaining caution to prevent the spread of COVID in our school, we have designated our hallways and the library/learning commons as common areas.

The collective decision that was made by our teaching staff did not come without a discussion. During our meeting we considered the possibilities to minimize contact, provide students more freedom, maintain predictable routines from day to day, and provide a reliable and consistent teaching space for teachers. Unanimously, we agreed having students move classrooms and everyone wearing masks in common areas was the best way to uphold the health and safety of students and staff at Wainwright High School.

We look forward to the time that these issues will not be a concern, but, at the same time, feel great pride in how our students are responding to the challenges that arise with the changes.





Orange Shirt Day

September 30th

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) Residential School (1891-1981) Commemoration Project and Reunion events that took place in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, in May 2013. This project was the vision of Esketemc (Alkali Lake) Chief Fred Robbins, who is a former student himself. It brought together former students and their families from the Secwepemc, Tsilhqot'in, Southern Dakelh and St'at'imc Nations along with the Cariboo Regional District, the Mayors and municipalities, School Districts and civic organizations in the Cariboo Region.

The events were designed to commemorate the residential school experience, to witness and honour the healing journey of the survivors and their families, and to commit to the ongoing process of reconciliation. Chief Justice Murray Sinclair challenged all of the participants to keep the reconciliation process alive, and as a result of the realization that every former student had similar stories.

Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of this project. As spokesperson for the Reunion group leading up to the events, former student Phyllis (Jack) Webstad told her story of her first day at residential school when her shiny new orange shirt, bought by her grandmother, was taken from her as a six-year old girl.

The annual Orange Shirt Day on September 30th opens the door to global conversation on all aspects of Residential Schools. It is an opportunity to create meaningful discussion about the effects of Residential Schools and the legacy they have left behind. A discussion all Canadians can tune into and create bridges with each other for reconciliation. A day for survivors to be reaffirmed that they matter, and so do those that have been affected. Every Child Matters, even if they are an adult, from now on.

The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the coming school year. It is an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

It all started in the Cariboo, and as a result, School District No. 27 has been chosen by the First Nations Education Steering Committee (FNESC) to pilot curriculum changes for all Grade 5 and Grade 10 students reflecting the residential school experience, to be implemented province-wide.

Resolutions have been passed in support of Orange Shirt Day by local governments, school districts, and First Nations in the Cariboo, at UBCM, and at FCM. The AFN Chiefs-in-Council passed a resolution declaring Orange Shirt Day "a first step in reconciliation", and pledging to bring the message home as well as to the government of Canada and the churches responsible.

On this day of September 30th, we call upon humanity to listen with open ears to the stories of survivors and their families, and to remember those that didn't make it.

Dear Parent or Guardian,

Re: COVID-19 School Immunization Program

Alberta Health Services (AHS), Public Health School Immunization Program is offering a dose of the COVID-19 vaccine to eligible students in Grades 7 to 12, who are born in 2009 or earlier.

Your child can get a dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech mRNA COVID-19 vaccine in school if they:

- have never had a COVID-19 vaccine (this will be their first dose)
- had their first dose of a COVID-19 vaccine at least 3 weeks ago (this will be their second dose)

Your child's school will let you know when the COVID-19 vaccine will be offered at their school.

This package includes a consent form and information for the COVID-19 vaccine.

To have your child immunized at school:

- · read this information package
- print the consent form and sign it

The consent form must be completed by a parent or guardian. Your child will not be immunized at school without your consent (permission).

On the consent form:

- Complete your child's personal information.
- Complete your child's health information.
- Sign and date the consent form. Return the form to the school no later than 1 week after school starts.

Call your school's public health nurse if your child:

- has had a severe side effect to an immunization in the past
- has any changes to their health before getting the COVID-19 vaccine
- gets another vaccine in the 14 days before immunizations will be provided at your school

If you agree to the immunization, your consent means that your child will get a **dose** of the COVID-19 vaccine. If the consent form is not returned, your child will not be immunized at their school.

Care after immunization information will be given to your child after they are immunized. Please review this information with your child.

Only one dose of vaccine will be given in school. If your child needs another dose, COVID-19 immunizations can be booked online at ahs.ca/vaccine or by contacting Health Link at 811.

If you **do not** wish to have your child immunized:

- do not sign the consent form
- do not return the consent form

If you agree to the immunization but later change your mind, please call your school's public health nurse to let them know.

If you have any questions or need more information, call your local public health office or 811.

Alberta Health Services collects health information according to Section 20 of the Health Information Act (HIA). This information is used to provide health services, determine eligibility for health services, or to carry out any other purpose authorized by the HIA. If you have any questions about this, please ask the healthcare provider giving the immunization or contact your local public health office. If you do not know your local public health office, call Health Link at 811 to get this information.

FIRE DRILLS lights on, doors closed and locked



Fire drill procedures:

- Fire alarm is sounded
- Exit with your group and teacher through the assigned evacuation exits OR the closest SAFEST exit.
- Go to your assigned muster point. Stay in your group with your teacher until the drill is over.
- · If you are not in the building when the fire alarm sounds, go to the Visitor Parking lot (south side of the gym entrance).

LOCK DOWN DRILLS lights off, doors closed and locked

Lock down procedures:

- A voice/alarm indicating "Emergency lock down NOW" is sounded
- All students are to go to the closest classroom with a teacher present
- Keep out of sight of windows, take cover under desks and remain on the floor until further instructions are given or drill is over.
- Students/staff not in the building when the alarm is sounded are to go to the Wainwright Health Center and remain in the main entrance foyer until the drill is over, (School will contact the Hospital).

SCHOOL EVACUATIONS

Should we need to evacuate:

- Announcement will be made that we are going into a FULL School Evacuation.
- Same evacuation procedures for fire are to be followed. The exception is that all students and staff are to go to their Muster Points and then walk to the Communiplex. Proceed to the hall #1 and wait for further instruction.

Please be reminded that when inclement weather does not allow us to operate our buses, schools will be open, classes are occurring and student learning continues. As with any absence, students who miss material will be provided with an opportunity to receive instructional material through an alternate means or catch up on missed school work upon return to school

Students are required to be in attendance until the last day of school as identified by the BTPS Board Approved Calendar, Final exams at the Grade 7 to 9 level will occur during the last five student days each semester. During non-examination times, tutorials, course review and alternate activities will occur. Final exams in non-diploma courses at the Grade 10 to 12 level will occur during the last five student days each semester. During non-examination times, tutorials, course review and alternate activities will occur. Final exams in diploma courses will occur as described in the Alberta Education Diploma exam schedule (www.education.alberta.ca) and submission of marks will occur the day the diploma marks are due to Alberta Ed. During nonexamination times, tutorials, course review and alternate activities will occur.

The 2021-2022 school calendar provides for instructional time for students that exceeds the requirements set by Alberta Education for instructional hours at the Grade 1-9 levels of 950 hours and at the Grade 10-12 levels for 1000 hours. The total student days in this year's calendar equals 181 days.
