

WHS honours National Truth and Reconciliation Day: Sept 30th



Sept 30th marked the first National day for Truth and Reconciliation in Canada, and BTPS spent the day in reflection and learning to honour one of the 94 Calls to Action.

The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation will mean different things to different people, though we will be united in the act of reflection. This is an important moment to honour the memories of survivors, who were harmed by horrendous abuses at residential schools, and their families, who have suffered intergenerational traumas. This is also a time to commemorate those who did not survive. For all of us, it will be difficult to acknowledge and sit with the truths of the past and its enduring impact on our society.

Katrin Heim led the BTPS learning services team in organizing a day filled with teacher supports as well as live presenters to facilitate learning for our students and staff alike.



Personal Land Acknowledgments

This session covered some Indigenous history about how Indigenous people acknowledged the land through Kinship beliefs and teachings. Kevin John shared why Land Acknowledgements are important today, including what this means for individuals invovled and what it means for Indigenous people.

We ended our session by offering students the opportunity to write their own Land Acknowledgements.

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Presenters and Key Note Speaker

Sam Demma



During a lack of hope and motivation, Sam consistently reminded himself of the lesson taught by Michael Loudfoot, his grade 12 world issues teacher -"Small Consistent Actions lead to Massive Global Changes." Sam's experiment with his theory all started with...garbage. At the age of 17, he co-founded PickWaste, a grassroots initiative that brings people together to pick up trash in their communities. That experience confirmed to him how small actions can have a big impact, and he lives that message in all he does. This memorable speech called on students to

re-ignite hope, inspire service to others and help them find their own Small Consistent Actions of truth and reconciliation. Sam told a story about gifting a friend a meal, a taco, which had a profund impact on them. He challenged us to "Be Someone's Taco".

Kohkum Helen John, Debbie Semeniuk and Kevin John

Elder Helen John was born on Onion Lake Cree Nation in December of 1938. As a wife mother to 8 Children, and a Residential School survivor, Kohkum Helen has persevered through much to enjoy the success she lives with today.

For the first time ever, Elder Helen John shared publicly about her life's experiences as a Residential School survivor, as an example of Indigenous Resilience and Success, and celebration of Indigenous brilliance. This powerful and moving presentation modelled the importance of confronting the past.

FIRE DRILLS

lights on, doors closed, and unlocked



Fire drill procedures:

- Fire alarm is sounded
- Exit with your group and teacher through the assigned evacuation ٠ exits OR the closest SAFEST exit.
- Go to your assigned muster point. Stay in your group with your ٠ teacher until the drill is over.
- If you are not in the building when the fire alarm sounds, go to the ٠ Visitor Parking lot (south side of the gym entrance).

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LOCK DOWN DRILLS lights off, doors closed and locked

Lock down procedures:

- A voice/alarm indicating "Emergency lock down NOW" is sounded
- All students are to go to the closest classroom with a teacher present
- Keep out of sight of windows, take cover under desks and remain on the floor until further instructions are given or drill is over.
- Students/staff not in the building when the alarm is sounded are to go to the Wainwright Health Center and remain in the main entrance foyer until the drill is over, (School will contact the Hospital).

SCHOOL EVACUATIONS

Should we need to evacuate:

- Announcement will be made that we are going into a FULL School Evacuation.
- Same evacuation procedures for fire are to be followed. The ٠ exception is that all students and staff are to go to their Muster Points and then walk to the Communiplex. Proceed to the hall #1 and wait for further instruction.



The first day for students is **September 1**, **2021**. February 2, 2022 is the first day of Term 2. June 29, 2022 is the last day of school for students.

Please be reminded that when inclement weather does not allow us to operate our buses, schools will be open, classes are occurring and student learning continues. As with any absence, students who miss material will be provided with an opportunity to receive instructional material through an alternate means or catch up on missed school work upon return to school.

Students are required to be in attendance until the last day of school as identified by the BTPS Board Approved Calendar. Final exams at the Grade 7 to 9 level will occur during the last five student days each semester. During non-examination times, tutorials, course review and alternate activities will occur. Final exams in non-diploma courses at the Grade 10 to 12 level will occur during the last five student days each semester. During non-examination times, tutorials, course review and alternate activities will occur. Final exams in diploma courses will occur as described in the Alberta Education Diploma exam schedule (www.education.alberta.ca) and submission of marks will occur the day the diploma marks are due to Alberta Ed. During non-examination times, tutorials, course review and alternate activities will occur.

The 2021-2022 school calendar provides for instructional time for students that exceeds the requirements set by Alberta Education for instructional hours at the Grade 1-9 levels of 950 hours and at the Grade 10-12 levels for 1000 hours. The total student days in this year's calendar equals 181 days.
