Focus on instructional practices that improve student engagement.



Results and Key Insights


During School PL days, teachers reflected upon the instructional strategies they are using in their classrooms, learned about additional strategies, and worked to increase student engagement in learning.

PAT, Diploma and AERR Review highlighted key areas of focus. Our survey data has shown significant improvements over the previous years, particularly in the areas of student engagement, and education quality. Although improvements can be noted in Math 9, math continues to be an area for growth. Additionally, the emotional health results of our students need further investigation.




Strategies	Build staff and student capacity for engaging in healthy, respectful relationships, and interactions with others. Provide student health and wellness support through a continuum of support model.
