Senior High (Gr 10-12) Subject/ Extracurricular	Staff Member	Past/Present/ Future	Items to share and/or celebrate
			In English 20-2, students have been exploring the theme of conformity and examining the effects it can have on individuals and society. Through class discussions, presentations, non-fiction articles, short stories, media connections, and written responses, students have considered how conformity can influence decision-making, impact personal identity, and shape communities both positively and negatively.
ELA 20.2	A. Grosky		This week, we are beginning our study of "The Crucible" by Arthur Miller. This play will serve as our play for continuing our exploration of conformity, particularly in the context of fear, social pressure, and the consequences of groupthink. Students will be engaging with the text through reading, discussion, and critical response, making connections to both historical and contemporary issues.
			In English 30-2, students have been reading <i>The Ultimate Gift</i> , a novel that has provided a strong foundation for discussion around personal growth, values, and decision-making. Alongside our reading, we have been focusing heavily on developing writing skills, with particular emphasis on composing thoughtful, well-structured responses within a set time limit—an important skill as students prepare for diploma exams.

ELA 9	A. Grosky		In English 9, students have begun their first unit, Innocence at Ignorance in the Holocaust. This unit is designed to build both historical understanding and critical literacy skills. Students he conducted research, created and delivered presentations, and studied a range of non-fiction articles to deepen their knowledge the Holocaust and its broader implications. Currently, we are using the novel The Boy in the Striped Pajar as our anchor text. This text provides an accessible and power narrative through which students can explore the themes of innocence, ignorance, and the human impact of prejudice and injustice. Students will continue to engage with the novel through discussion, and written response activities, may connections between historical events, and the literature.
